'The distinctive clothing worn by members of the same organization or body or by children attending certain schools.'

- We have noticed that some children are not wearing the correct uniform and are sometimes wearing PE Kit on the wrong day.
- Our uniform is blue sweat shirt, white collared teeshirt, navy skirt or trousers or in some cases joggers. Summer dresses. Navy shorts
- We would like to continue to wear PE kit to school but the kit should be in the school colours. Navy sweat shirt or hoodie, white teeshirt, blue shorts or joggers, leggings.
- Footwear
- School shoes or trainers for outside
- Plimsolls or slippers for inside

This will be compulsory in September and is encouraged this term

If your child cannot tie laces, we ask that they come in velcro trainers.

School uniform plays a key role in promoting pride, self-confidence, and a feeling of belonging within the student body. These factors contribute to students' wellbeing, removing the additional pressures of deciding what to wear and added stress of meeting the expectations of their peers.

	All children must have a coat in school every day A waterproof coat in their book bag is perfect for warmer days.
	REASONS TO TIE UP HAIR At Nightingale we ask that all hair is tied up. There are several reasons for this. Between the ages of a year to seven, it is crucial time for children's eye development. There is a school of thought, that if the hair is blocking one eye or falling partially over both eyes, that it can block out both daylight and sensory stimulation. A lack of either, can inhibit the development of the eyes. It is important to find ways to clip or tie hair away from the face for this reason. Hair chewing habits can be prevented if the hair is tied away from the face. Headlice - the best ways to avoid spreading nits, is prevention. Having the hair tied back, particularly in a bun or plait is one of the most effective ways of keeping the nits and lice at bay. With the hair tied back, it makes it more difficult for the lice to grab hold of the hair. Long loose hair gets played and fiddled with by the person sitting behind causing arguments and loss of learning. Hair gets into food of the person sitting next to the child at lunchtime.

This calendar applies to community schools, community special schools, VC schools and nursery schools and sets the days on which school transport will be provided. While most Foundation, VA, foundation special, free schools and academy trusts who are able to set their own dates, adopt the Norfolk Model, we advise you to check with your child's school before making holiday or other commitments.
